









Countries with the greatest proportion of people without religion (including Agnostics and Atheists)



Universalizing Religion:

 A universalizing religion attempts to be global by appealing to all people regardless of where they live in the world.

Examples:

Constrainty, Islam, Buddhism, Sikhism



Ethnic Religion:

 An ethnic religion appeals primarily to one group living in one place. One usually becomes a member by birth or by adopting a cultural identity.

Examples:

Hinduism, Judaism, Confucianism, Daoism, Smiritoism, Ethnic African religions

Monotheism:

("mono" = one, "theism" = belief in god)

The belief in a single deity/god.

Examples:

Christianity, Islam, Judaism, and some forms of Hinduism.



"It's called monotheism, but it looks like downsizing to me."

Polytheism:

("poly" = many, "theism" = belief in god)

The belief in many gods.

Examples:

Ancient Greek & Romans, Hinduism, Shintoism, Chinese folk religion, Thelema, Wicca,
